
Million Woman Marches San Diego/San Marcos, Jan 21, 2017



Over 150 members of UUFSD and San Diego County cluster UU congregations joined in solidarity with the Million Woman March. Estimates are that about 60,000 people attended the rallies and marches in downtown San Diego and at Palomar College.

Declaration of Conscience

At this extraordinary time in our nation's history, we are called to affirm our profound commitment to the fundamental principles of justice, equity and compassion, to truth and core values of American society.

In the face of looming threats to immigrants, Muslims, people of color, and the LGBTQ community and the rise of hate speech, harassment and hate crimes, we affirm our belief in the inherent worth and dignity of every person.

In opposition to any steps to undermine the right of every citizen to vote or to turn back advances in access to health care and reproductive rights, we affirm our commitment to justice and compassion in human relations.

And against actions to weaken or eliminate initiatives to address the threat of climate change – actions that would threaten not only our country but the entire planet – we affirm our unyielding commitment to protect the interdependent web of all existence.

We will oppose any and all unjust government actions to deport, register, discriminate, or despoil.

As people of conscience, we declare our commitment to translate our values into action as we stand on the side of love with the most vulnerable among us.

We welcome and invite all to join in this commitment for justice.

The time is now.



Thirty Days of Love 2017

For 30 Days of Love this year, we are exploring what it means for Unitarian Universalism to be a nurturing, humble and steady hand on the side of justice in 2017.

The Human Rights Task Force petitioned The Honorable Kevin De Leon, Senate President pro Tem of the State of California in support of SB54, the California Values Act. The Act ensures that state and local resources are not used to fuel mass deportations, separate families, or divide Californians on the basis of race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, immigration status, or national or ethnic origins.





The Dakota Access Pipeline - We petitioned President Trump to

1) Ensure that the full environmental review process—for the entire pipeline—is completed in an inclusive and transparent manner; and 2) Deny a permit for the pipeline in ANY area that will pose a threat to the water of the Native people of Standing Rock or any of the millions of people downstream from where the pipeline may pass.

Petition in support of a Federal Revenue-neutral Carbon Fee and Dividend We petitioned the Cities of Encinitas and Carlsbad to vote on a proposed CFD resolution. Our second step is to encourage members to be "Witnesses for Environmental Justice" and appear before the Encinitas and Carlsbad City Councils when the resolution is considered. The Environmental Justice Task Force continued to petition the cities of Solana Beach, Carlsbad, and Oceanside to pass similar resolutions.





Gun Violence Prevention Initiative Our Religious Education program embarked on a multi-level approach to Gun Violence Prevention. Our first step was to encourage the parents of our children to sign the Brady Campaign "ASK" pledge. (Sundays, February 5 & 12). ASK encourages parents to ask the following question when their children visit other homes: "Is there an unlocked gun in your house?" Another step being considered is to approach school PTAs and propose that this initiative spread to the community at large

Munchies and Messaging, Saturday January 28 & Sunday, January 29

About 70 people of members, friends and neighbors got together, in two groups, to follow up on the Million Woman March with a post card writing campaign. Participants discussed key issues to convey to our Members of Congress, and the media.

Catherine Blakespear who coordinated one group wrote: The American governmental structure is our protection against tyranny and fascism. We need to empower and pressure our legislative branch to be the needed check on President Trump. Our congressional representative Darryl Issa has to feel our heat. This letter writing party one week after the Women's March was designed to keep the fire on him. Sitting alone and feeling outraged doesn't accomplish change. We have to tell our decision makers what matters most to us. Any way you can reach them is worthwhile.



Linda Pratt who coordinated a second group wrote: We sent an invitation out to our friends and asked them to gather at our home on January 29th and nearly 30 people responded. The objectives were to demonstrate that WE ARE NOT ALONE IN OUR OUTRAGE and to educate ourselves about the various ways that we can make our voices heard. We helped each other craft messages that we wrote on postcards and notecards to elected officials and the media. For many this was the first time they had participated in any type of political action outside of voting.

Forming the UUFSD Indivisible Group Saturday, February 4



Twenty-three members and friends met to form the UUFSD Indivisible Group. The group will concentrate its efforts on influencing local Members of Congress (MoC) to take stands protecting human rights. We currently have a weekly call to action, suggesting we write or call our MoCs on particular issues and positions. At the second meeting the group decided on a name. We are "The UUFSD Indivisible Patriots."
