Minnesota’s singer-songwriter Peter Mayer defies easy description. He is a deeply spiritual man, a devoted husband and father, and a gentle, kind friend. We were honored to have Peter perform a live concert on Jan. 21 in Founder’s Hall. Peter played some of his older, well-known pieces like “Beauty of the Earth” and “All the World is



One,” as well as some new, not-yet recorded songs. He also took requests from the audience and gave us “Head of the Shed” and “Japanese Bowl.” The appreciative audience enjoyed hearing the stories behind his music, such as a tribute to Harriet Tubman, inspired by his daughter sharing what she learned in 4th grade about the heroic woman who helped many enslaved people “keep on going” to freedom. Peter was the guest speaker/singer in a worship service themed “Mindfulness in Song.” Peter led the congregation in a musical mediation/call to worship called “Breathe In.” For the intergenerational sharing, children gathered on the chancel and joined in the chorus of “Dr. Seuss” by singing “Dr. Seuss ... is on the loose ... in your brain ...” Peter’s “sermon” combined his spoken reflection on mindfulness, which he finds a valuable practice, though not the “default operating system” of his brain, with several songs on the same theme. Peter described the comfort he finds in knowing that he is part of the greater whole of the universe. The entire service reflected the teachings of Thich Nhat Hanh on mindfulness, and the recognition that we are not just individuals but inter-beings, connected to everything and everyone.

Dreambuilder's Update

The new curb and gutter along Solana Drive as required by the City has been completed. In addition we received a comprehensive budget estimate for Phases 2, 3, and 4 of the Capital Campaign work scope from White Construction. They include:

- Phase 2, the firetruck turnaround and additional parking,
- Phase 3, a new shade structure at the Amphitheater,
- Phase 4, a new AV Kiosk with accessible toilet rooms and other accessibility improvements in the Amphitheater.



On Sunday, March 12, the congregation approved an expenditure of up to \$250,000 improvements to the office building. Final plans are being worked on for the interior as well as exterior improvements.

Emma's Revolution - After the Rain Concert, Saturday, March 25



Emma's Revolution is the activist singer-songwriter duo of Pat Humphries and Sandy O, who have been singing together for over 20 years. On March 25, they returned to UUFSD for a concert entitled "After the Rain." Combining old favorites with new songs written during the pandemic lockdown, they inspired, moved, and entertained us with their beautiful harmonies and powerful lyrics. They sang "Two Rooftops," a song commissioned by UUFSD member, Lisa Shaffer, for her husband, Steve Bartram. The title refers to two almost identical etchings of Japanese thatched roof houses, by a relatively obscure Japanese artist; one Steve bought in Japan and one Lisa bought in New York, years before they ever met. Pat Humphries talked about the impact of her well-known and widely sung "Swimming to the Other Side." The song caught the attention of a documentary filmmaker who is now working on a film about Emma's Revolution's (Pat Humphries and Sandy O), lives and music. The concert concluded with their call for climate action, "Out House is on Fire." All their music is available for download on their website, emmasrevolution.com.

Emma's Revolution - "Keep On Moving Forward" Sunday Service



"Keep on Moving Forward" was the theme for the March 26 worship service, highlighting UUFSD's commitment to social justice. The service included testimonials from Lisa Shaffer about why she pledges, and from Buck Chavarria, founder of Rising Tide Ranch, which uses one of the tiny homes built by Casas de Luz, to help men living on the street find help with alcohol and drug addiction. Emma's Revolution shared their stories of social justice work through their music, including "We Are One," written for a visit to the DMZ in Korea; "Bound for Freedom" calling on each of us to commit to action; and "Shelter" about the need to care for each other

so we can continue working for justice. For intergenerational sharing, Sandy talked about the many ways we communicate, with gestures, our faces, and our words, then led the congregation in singing "Peace, Salaam, Shalom," composed for a peace rally after 9/11. The service was a moving tribute to how our Fellowship keeps on moving forward, living out our values and working to make the world a better place.

The Courageous Love Award is for individuals or organizations that have exhibited courageous love and touched hearts. Presenting a Courageous Love Award is our opportunity to reach beyond your core social justice folks, and to engage your whole congregation or community in social justice work.

We presented Courageous Love Awards to San Diegans For Gun Violence Prevention (SD4GVP) and our very own Ted Foster.

San Diegans for Gun Violence Prevention is organized and run by the members of the San Diego chapters of [Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America](#) and the [Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence](#). It is a coalition of many organizations and individuals which has provided the framework for collective actions that have magnified the results achieved. We at UUFSD are proud to be a coalition member.

Ted Foster was instrumental in many of our members and friends signing up for the Ohm Connection energy saving service that rewards you for saving energy when it matters most to the grid and the environment.

Ted's administration of the 2022 UUFSD-the-Vote project was exceptional. started in February. Our first campaign was postcard writing to encourage California voters to vote in the primary on June 7. Our second campaign was postcard writing to encourage Florida voters to vote in the primary on August 23. Our third campaign was writing letters and postcards for the November 8 general elections. These were mailed out in October to voters in various parts of the nation. Our fourth campaign was writing letters and postcards for the Georgia runoff election on December 6. This year we wrote 2,785 post cards. Everyone who participated deserves special thanks. We did make a difference in the results of the election. Thank you Ted for your encouragement and leadership.

Gun Violence Prevention at UUFSD

The UUFSD Social Justice in Action sponsored a petition to Senators Blakespeare and Skinner in support of Senate Bill 8, that would require California gun owners to obtain liability insurance for the negligent or accidental use of their firearms. If enacted, the bill would make California the first state in the nation to adopt such legislation. We will continue to support local, State and Federal legislation to strengthen gun regulation throughout the year. Thank you to the 52 members and friends who signed our petition

Casas de Luz's Small Cottage Decelles Unicorn Village




Casas de Luz in partnership with Palomar UU Fellowship and North County LBGTQ center will construct the Decelles Unicorn Village in May and officially inaugurate it on Saturday, July 2. This village is for at-risk youth who are aging out of the Foster Care system and at risk of being homeless. Iris Ann Decelles is the sponsor of this village. The North County Center will be operating the village following their current Unicorn program. PUFF provides the parking lot and facilities. This is true partnership in action.

This is the third village that Casas de Luz has built since 2021. Each village serves a specific population, refugees, sober living single men and at-risk youth. We have built 9 cottages, each one has a sponsor who pays for materials and they are built with volunteer labor. The plan is to complete another 6 before the end of the year.

Thank you UUFSD for supporting this program which will truly help serve our homeless neighbors.

Church of the Larger Fellowship Become a Pen Pal



In 2022, members and friends at UUFSD wrote Holiday Greetings to prisoners throughout the country who found UU-ism while incarcerated, now members of the Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF). After taking a prerequisite correspondence course on Unitarian Universalism, our incarcerated members are eligible for a pen pal. The CLF Leadership Team is working hard to recruit more free-world UU writers to become pen pals to one of our incarcerated members. The waiting list to receive a pen pal is long.

Might you be interested in becoming a free-world pen pal to someone who is experiencing incarceration? Our expectation is that you would write one letter each month -- you would be the voice of stability and support, which is quite different from the environment of most prisons. This is a wonderful opportunity to live into your UU values.
