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From The Board

I feel so very excited about where we are as a Fellowship and spiritual community. There has been so much positive and needed change during my past three years on the Board, and I am glad to have been a part of it all.

JULY 2023

We are so fortunate to have had three incredible staff members join us in the last year! Rev Ellie's new two-year contract as our full-time minister starts August 15 and includes our intention to begin the process of Contract – to - Call in August of 2024. Steve Milloy, who joined us in September, will continue as our Music Director; and Denise Clark, who joined us in January, as our new Congregational Administrator, is just the perfect fit. Hopefully, our improved offering for our DRE position of 20 hours/week and benefits will enable us to fill this remaining open position.

In the interest of good communication and transparency, the Board has continued our Open Letters and organized three congregational forums on different issues. At the January forum, a draft behavioral covenant and a few Bylaw suggestions to address the lack of clarity in some of our policies evolved into deeper conversations about our overall governance philosophy that will be continuing into next year.

At the February forum, our Dream Builders updated the status of our capital campaign projects and now there are some exciting updates to share! After receiving bids on the Administration Building remodel that were over \$600k, we reached out to Chris Kolb, who has done a significant amount of work for UUFSD throughout the years. With Chris's sustainable approach, we will be to go ahead with the original design plans for a cost of \$281K. The project will take a little longer than if we had signed with a big company, but we are so fortunate to have someone with such a heartfelt connection to UUFSD taking on this project and anticipate it being completed by January. We thank Clint Stoddard for taking the lead in supervising this project. During construction, the "Office" will be relocated to the Library so that space will be unavailable for meetings.

Regarding amphitheater improvements, we are in the process of finalizing a contract for the work necessary to obtain our permits. Design development will be completed by early fall and presented to our members for input. Once we have the permits, the very first project to complete is the turnaround for an emergency vehicle (the hammerhead) per mandate from the Fire Marshal. Once we have the hammerhead completed, we can go on to any of the other projects in Phases 2, 3, and 4. The lead for this effort is Jon Luft, and we thank him for lending his professional expertise and guidance.

To help with the expense of the required hammerhead construction, we just learned that we have been awarded a \$50,000 matching grant from the Spirit Level Foundation. Pledges of \$42,000 have already been received so we just need to raise \$8,000 more to qualify for receipt of the entire grant.

One last update to share is the decision the Board made in early June about our Covid vaccination policy. The national emergency is over and so much has changed as we have learned to live with this virus and as very effective vaccines have become available. While we strongly encourage everyone to keep all vaccinations and boosters up to date, we no longer will require proof of this in terms of covid.

I say a huge and heartfelt thank you to the awesome Board members with whom I have had the privilege to serve.

Thanks to all of you for allowing me to serve as your Board President for the past year.

Solana Beach Fiesta del Sol - May 20 & 21












A "Celebration Of Life Service" will be held at UUFSD on Saturday, August 5, 2023

Ed Ulm July 23, 1942 - October 30, 2022

In 1965, Ed Ulm's his first job was as a biologist in the National Institutes of Health lab of Dr. George Glenner. Decades later, his last job was #1 volunteer at the George G. Glenner Alzheimer's Family Centers, where he led singing and dancing activities and lent his helpful and positive energy wherever itwas needed

Just two blocks from his Encinitas home, Ed experienced a sense of purpose and joy at the Glenner Center. He participated in a variety of daily activities and learned to live with vascular dementia.

Ed's profession was Biochemistry, where his successes included pharmaceutical research and development at Merck, Ciba Geigy, Ligand Pharmaceuticals, Conforma Therapeutics Corp and Biogen Idec. A patent and contributions to, or authorship of, more than 100 articles are part of his professional legacy.

His love was Charlotte Dale Brandon Ulm – Ed's wife of 57 years.

Charlotte's poem "Reward for Impatience" is the voice of a young bride-to-be. It tells of a stream of worries: wedding venue, health, car, philosophical, theological and of her gown trailing through the mud on a rainy January wedding day.

The poem also describes a much brighter marriage day one. The sun was shining when Ed and Charlotte, "stopped to see a world of sparkling rainbows in the arms of the forest." and, as the poem describes, "Brittle branches played a tinkling symphony just for us."

Son Trent's reflection includes memories of his 'papa's' kindness, patience and love of all people.

Ed was the youngest of four born to Edgar Hermas Ulm and Genevive Sara Sant. Sarah, the eldest child, died in an accident at age 2. Sisters Nancy and Judy filled Pennsylvania family life with five nieces, two nephews two grand-nieces and favorite brother-in-law Gene Reid.

His youth memorabilia includes the standard baseball team photos. (He wasn't very good.)

In Ed's sophomore year, he discovered what would become a lifelong passion – singing! Ed fell in love with musical theater. His first role was Woody in 'Finian's Rainbow,' with Finian played by Van Dyke Parks, who later became Brian Wilson's collaborator and 'Smile' album lyricist.

Wedding soloist, classical music, contemporary, jazz scatting, Ed could sing it all!

His bright blue eyes reflected the sparkle of an easy laugh and generous heart. Trent recalls how Ed was a pun master, always enjoying friends' and family's reactions to his dry sense of humor.

The Ulm family is very close, generous and loving. They are positive and grateful people despite experiencing their share of loss and hardship.

Memories include the joy that daughter Janelle, brought to Ed and Charlotte.

The UUFSD family became the Ulm's family when they joined the congregation in 2014. A UUFSD choir performance was Ed's last concert. Performed in a large, made-to-feel-like-home room at Belmont Village, he silently kept time with the voices of friends and family. And just a few days later, the joyful music that was Ed Ulm's earthly life was silent.

Ed felt that this poem, "Courage", by Anne Sexton offered a great perspective on what living is all about. It was very meaningful to Ed and Charlotte after their family suffered the sudden and tragic loss of their beautiful eight year old daughter, Janelle.

Courage

It is in the small things we see it.
The child's first step,
as awesome as an earthquake.
The first time you rode a bike,
wallowing up the sidewalk.
The first spanking when your heart
went on a journey all alone.
When they called you crybaby
or poor or fatty or crazy
and made you into an alien,
you drank their acid
and concealed it.

Later,

if you faced the death of bombs and bullets
you did not do it with a banner,
you did it with only a hat to
comver your heart.
You did not fondle the weakness inside
you
though it was there.
Your courage was a small coal
that you kept swallowing.
If your buddy saved you
and died himself in so doing,
then his courage was not courage,
it was love; love as simple as shaving
soap.

Later,

if you have endured a great despair, then you did it alone, getting a transfusion from the fire, picking the scabs off your heart, then wringing it out like a sock. Next, my kinsman, you powdered your sorrow, you gave it a back rub and then you covered it with a blanket and after it had slept a while it woke to the wings of the roses and was transformed

Later,

when you face old age and its natural conclusion your courage will still be shown in the little ways, each spring will be a sword you'll sharpen, those you love will live in a fever of love, and you'll bargain with the calendar and at the last moment when death opens the back door you'll put on your carpet slippers and stride out.

We couldn't help but appreciate Ed's humor, supportiveness and general amiability. That's what we'll always remember about him.

Ed and I sang together in the UUFSD choir. I envied his clear sweet tenor sound that seemed so effortless. Although he had weathered tragedies in his life, he always seemed cheerful. Even after dementia had taken away his ability to form a clear sentence, he could still answer a greeting with an upbeat "bippity bop" and a smile. But what does that mean? To me it always showed his unquenchable joyful spirit. I will miss him.

When I think of Ed Ulm I think of his big smile and his passion for music. Despite the significant sorrows of losing their daughter and of Charlotte losing her voice, both Charlotte and Ed have radiated warmth and kindness.

I remember once at deBenneville Pines, Ed took the stage in our talent show and spoke of how music had changed his life. He had appeared in many musicals and seemed to be able to live his life with something of the tempo and joy that singing through those musicals brings. We were all touched when our very new minister, Rev Ellie, went to his bedside in his final days and sang some of his favorite show tunes to him. Ed was also sensitive to visual beauty and landscaped his yard, which is adjacent to the San Diego Botanical Garden to be a lovely haven. He and his son Trent had also combined their talents to design the creative separate space that Trent occupies in their house.

Finally even as he headed into his final illness, Ed continued to be gracious and genial, so that even though he was losing his memory, he still seemed the perfect gentleman. Special thanks to Charlotte, Trent, and to Karla Mayer who combined their efforts to care for Ed and to ease his passage at the end.

I found that Ed was a many faceted person. He was a poet, a thespian, an author, and a person with the love of crafting music with his voice. Ed had creativity, curiosity and I think some eccentricity. And he learned how to communicate these gifts through his writing.

Observing Ed, I saw he was pattern-oriented and rhythmic. He could see rhymes and rhythms in nature that are there and expressed these through his writing puns, poetry, and in his work. He was a person who would not give up. He projected hope and faith giving a trusting nature and honored honesty in people.

Ed loved music and he considered his voice a blessing which he shared with many people. He loved being in the UUFSD Choir and singing. His love of singing, along with his acting, his writings, and his humor and puns, was a special gift. His listening skills produced a kind heart. He was creative and a person who could laugh at himself. Looking at Ed when we talked, I could see passion. There was always a glint in his eyes as he smiled

Karla Mayer

I did not have the pleasure of knowing Ed before he was well into his journey of living with dementia. The man I was honored to get to know and came to love, can best be described by sharing a story about a simple act of kindness he extended to someone in need.

Ed attended a dementia day program called the Glenner Center near his home in Encinitas. Initially, Ed participated as a "volunteer". He took his work very seriously. The staff appreciated his enthusiastic and buoyant style when leading exercises and his beautiful singing voice that encouraged others to sing along.

The director of the program called me shortly after Ed started attending. She was elated and very grateful as she recounted Ed's "miracle work". He had lovingly included a long time participant who was non-verbal, easily agitated and had never joined any group activity. Instead of screaming and rocking in the corner by herself, she sat with Ed and ate her lunch. With Ed's patient and nonthreatening prompting, she slowly joined for exercises and singing. Even as Ed wrestled with the frustration of losing his own words, he was able to see this woman struggling. He "saw"

her and connected with her in a way no one else had been able to. He gently elevated her. This is who Ed was. I admire the grace with which Ed navigated his steadily declining abilities as the vascular dementia took over. I admire the fierce love he had for his family until the very end.

I miss the twinkle in Ed's eye and the spontaneous, jaunty jigs he would perform. I miss his melodious singing voice. I miss his grateful, knowing smile when he couldn't find his words, and we would finish our conversation speaking in fake German or fun gibberish. I miss Ed.

Wenda Alvarez On being Ed and 80

Ed was a doer. Until his final days, he preferred being in motion, being productive and weaving his days with music and people. He is one of my elder teachers and here's a few things he taught me in his parting year.

- You can **play with balls** in the house.
- **Dislikes are transitional**. Basketball, a sport I disliked in school, was fun on the street in front of the Ulm's house with Ed and Charlotte. His interest and endurance usually outlasted mine.
- **Dance:** in the kitchen, the living room, with a true love, family and friends -- preferably holding hands.
- **Celebrate:** especially with silly sunglasses and deep loving thoughts. At his 80th birthday party, Ed read out loud the tender lovely verses in his card from Charlotte. His voice and her thoughts left a lasting imprint on my heart and mind.
- **Socialize.** Encourage friends to stop by. Remind them you'd welcome an invitation to stop by their home, have lunch, etc.
- Love, memories and emotions run deep. Reluctance to reveal them fades.
- **Sing along**. Hymns sung with gusto at church should never be taken for granted. Bedside choruses of old friends are a beautiful gateway to stillness.
- Make time. Love is precious, lasting and always worth sharing.
