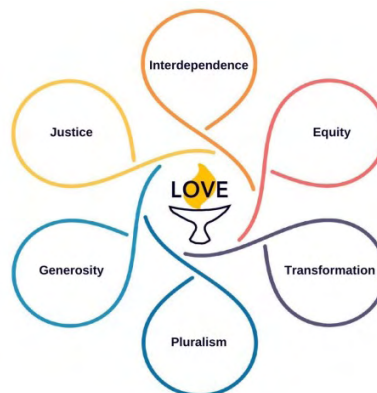

Beloved Members and Friends at UUFSD,

M Jade Kaiser writes, “to become is a lifelong process. Nothing is constant, not even the self.” How very true this is! Unitarian Universalism asserts that revelation is ongoing, and so, too, are we. It continues to be an exciting and transformational year at UUFSD. We have added two new staff members to our team, hiring Rose Littler Reidel as our Director of Religious Exploration and Fellowship, and Ivey Merrill as our new Church Administrator. She and Denise are working together for the next month before we say farewell to Denise, who we have loved working with!

We are at an exciting crossroads at UUFSD. As a congregation, beginning in February, we'll be embarking on a visioning endeavor to establish our values, mission, and tangible goals to serve that mission.

There will be three “Visioning Our Values Workshops,” and I hope you will join one of these as we begin the first step towards having a more intentional mission and vision for the congregation. Two of these will be held in person: One on Thursday, February 1st, at 10:30, and one on Sunday, February 4th, at 11:30. The third will be a zoom only workshop on Wednesday, February 7, at 8pm.

As a congregation, we're also discussing the future of Unitarian Universalism. In June, at the UUA's general assembly, the delegates will vote on a new draft to our tradition's bylaws, which we call Article II. We have an exceptional task force that has been presenting information to the congregation about this possible change, and I invite all of you to participate and learn more about the six proposed values, bound together by love. These values are Justice, Equity, Transformation, Interdependence, Generosity, and Pluralism. Although they would replace our eight principles and six sources in our tradition's bylaws, the principles and sources would not be replaced in congregational life and engagement. The proposed change would work in tandem with each other rather than in opposition.

It is an exciting time to be Unitarian Universalist, and an even more exciting time for our community! We have so many opportunities to think outside the box of what congregational life can look like for our fellowship. And I'm so excited to begin that exploration with all of you!

Our Values In Action

Helping Our Neighbors Interfaith Overnight Shelter 2024



Through the Overnight Shelter Network, UUFSD will again cooperate with St. James Catholic Church to provide shelter and meals for individuals who are experiencing homelessness. St. James will provide the facility and we will provide dinners, hosted meals, and hosts to spend the night from 1/28/24 through 2/4/24. UUFSD has been providing these services for decades.

In the Network's 37th season (2022-23), more than 100 guests were provided 3,551 bed-nights in addition to 10,650 meals. The guests included 19 families (53 people), 22 single men, 16 single women and 6 couples without children. They stay in each church for two weeks, then move to the next, providing 10 weeks of warm meals, dry protected beds and a safe place to land each evening. The guests are always so appreciative, and the volunteers have the chance to connect with them in an informal setting. Thank you, all 50+ past volunteers! Watch for sign-ups in early January.

UUFSD Garden Club



UUFSD started a Garden Group in July, 2023 to bring together those interested in gardening as a hobby, to feed their families with healthy, fresh food, and help the planet. We had four topics to explore: Fruit and Vegetable Gardening, Flower and Ornamental Gardening, Seed and Plant Swapping, and Garden Tours and Visits. We typically host a monthly meeting after the service on Sunday to discuss one of the topics. The fourth topic was the most special — it involved visits to member's gardens.

For our first garden tour in September, Greg and Christine Trigeiro hosted us at their 3/4 acre property in Vista. We saw avocado, apple, oranges, Lychee, Longan fruit, loquat, kumquat, guava, star fruit, tangerine, pomegranate, tamarin, Cherimoya, blueberry, raspberry, pomelo, mulberry, sapote, pineapple guava, banana and rhubarb. Some of these were newer plantings, but many were big, well established plants from the previous owner. We had a chance to mingle in small groups and learn about each new variety of fruit tree.

Linda Luisi and Ted Foster hosted us at their La Costa home in October. We walked among 30 fruit trees (small to large), such as avocados, persimmons, papayas, mango, apple, etc. We discussed planting and pruning concepts including grounds maintenance, easy fruit picking, and how to fit more varieties in our space. We saw berries, veggies, and herbs planted directly in the ground, in raised beds, and in pots. Linda and Ted have used all these planting techniques to create a compact garden on their normal-sized city lot with creativity and art, and we came away impressed.

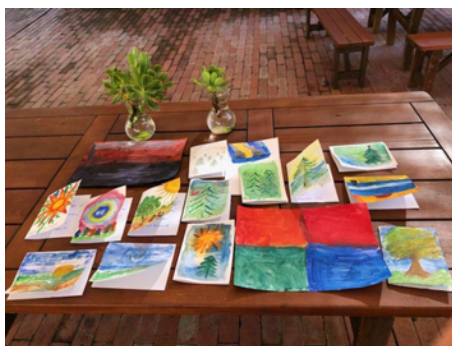

Article II

Understanding Article II

The most important UU theological debate in four decades is happening this year. The Seven Principles and Six Sources of UUism, which have centered us as UUs since 1985, are up for major revision. The UUA has proposed a complete rewrite of Article II of the UUA bylaws. The Article II Task Force hosted an all-congregation meeting in Founders' Hall to explain and clarify the proposal." The six proposed UU values are "Interdependence," "Equity," "Transformation," "Generosity," "Pluralism" and "Justice," and all the values are based on "Love." The current Seven Principles and Six Sources are eliminated as separate ideas. This is a big theological change.

There are various viewpoints on the wisdom of this change. Are these the right values? Is there room for the current principles and sources? Is there poetry? Why now? What do we want out of the revision? Does it matter or is it just words? What reasons have been offered pro and con? Are there supplemental or different values, sources, or principles that our Fellowship wants to adopt?

Our Board established a Task Force to organize our study of the revised Article II. The goal was to engage the entire congregation. This was achieved from October through December, in discussion and debate, learning and reading, and proposals and decision, about the revision. Here are the Task Force's comments.

UUFSD Groups Study and Discuss Proposed Article II Revision Biggest UU Theological Debate Since 1982 Principles & Sources Would Be Replaced with Values

The core of UUism is defined in Article II of the UUA's bylaws. That's where the familiar Seven Principles and Six Sources of UUism are codified. Because UU beliefs and practices are so diverse, Article II is the only place where every UU congregation agrees on the essence of what unites us.

The current Article II was adopted in 1982 and with some changes has remained until now. This year, the UUA proposed a major re-write of Article II to replace the Principles and Sources with six "Values" centered around "Love" and derived from "Inspirations." The proposal will be adopted or rejected at next June's UUA General Assembly, where every UU congregation is entitled to voting delegates.

UUFSD has until then to discern what we as a congregation think about the proposal. With tabling in the Core Area, small group discussions, and all-congregational meetings, the UUFSD Article II Task Force has been focusing attention on the proposal, with the goal of having an all-congregational poll in May on how our delegates should vote.

To make a responsible decision between old and new, each member of UUFSD can personally understand and consider the revision. Take time to examine the new version. Participate in gatherings and explore resources on our website. Comment and see others' opinions on our website comments section and on our private UUFSD Discord chat board.

Just as pledging, attending services, and participating in the life of UUFSD are parts of being a member, so too is understanding and shaping our essential theology.

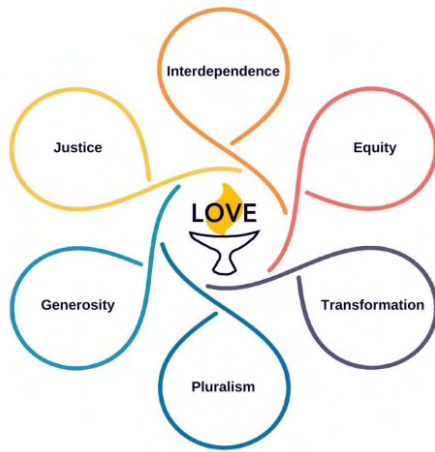

Final Revision

Article II

Purposes and Covenant

Section C-2.1. Purposes

The Unitarian Universalist Association will devote its resources to and use its organizational powers for religious, educational, and humanitarian purposes. Its primary purposes are:

- to assist congregations in their vital ministries,
- to support and train leaders both lay and professional,
- to foster lifelong faith formation and spiritual development,
- to heal historic injustices,
- to support and encourage the creation of new Unitarian Universalist communities, and
- to advance our Unitarian Universalist values in the world.

The Unitarian Universalist Association will actively engage its members in the transformation of the world through liberating Love.

Section C-2.2. Values and Covenant

As Unitarian Universalists, we covenant, congregation-to-congregation and through our Association, to support and assist one another in our ministries. We draw from our heritages of freedom, reason, hope, and courage, building on the foundation of love.

Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual discipline of Love.

Inseparable from one another, these shared values are:

Interdependence

We honor the interdependent web of all existence. With reverence for the great web of life and with humility, we acknowledge our place in it.

We covenant to protect Earth and all beings from exploitation. We will create and nurture sustainable relationships of care and respect, mutuality and justice. We will work to repair harm and damaged relationships.

Pluralism

We celebrate that we are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and theology.

We covenant to learn from one another in our free and responsible search for truth and meaning. We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect.

Justice

We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive.

Article II

We covenant to dismantle racism and all forms of systemic oppression. We support the use of inclusive democratic processes to make decisions within our congregations, our Association, and society at large.

Transformation

We adapt to the changing world.

We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically. Openness to change is fundamental to our Unitarian and Universalist heritages, never complete and never perfect.

Generosity

We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.

We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality.

Equity

We declare that every person has the right to flourish with inherent dignity and worthiness.

We covenant to use our time, wisdom, attention, and money to build and sustain fully accessible and inclusive communities.

Section C-2.3. Inspirations

Direct experiences of transcending mystery and wonder are primary sources of Unitarian Universalist inspiration. These experiences open our hearts, renew our spirits, and transform our lives. We draw upon, and are inspired by, sacred, secular, and scientific understandings that help us make meaning and live into our values. These sources ground us and sustain us in ordinary, difficult, and joyous times. We respect the histories, contexts, and cultures in which these sources were created and are currently practiced. Grateful for the experiences that move us, aware of the religious ancestries we inherit, and enlivened by the diversity which enriches our faith, we are called to ever deepen and expand our wisdom.

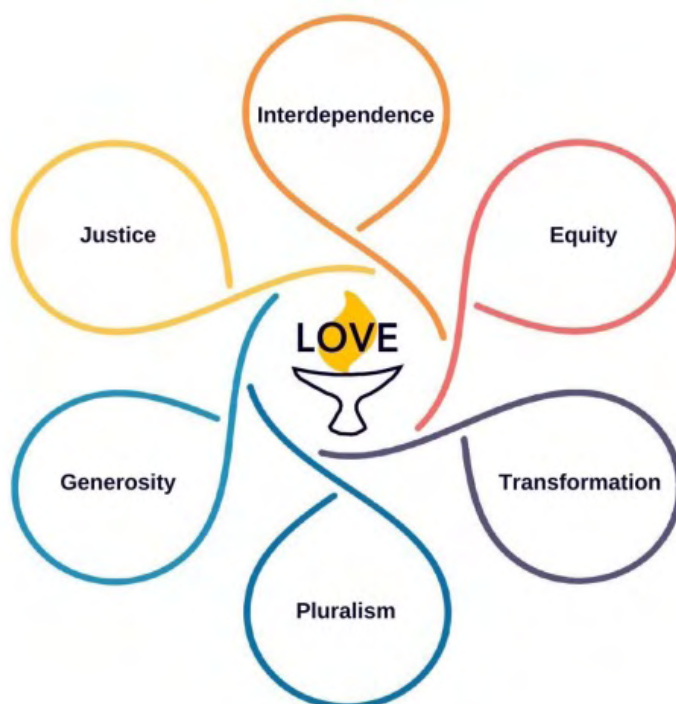
Section C-2.4. Inclusion

Systems of power, privilege, and oppression have traditionally created barriers for persons and groups with particular identities, ages, abilities, and histories. We pledge to replace such barriers with ever-widening circles of solidarity and mutual respect. We strive to be an Association of congregations that truly welcome all persons who share our values. We commit to being an Association of congregations that empowers and enhances everyone's participation, especially those with historically marginalized identities.

Section C-2.5. Freedom of belief

Congregational freedom and the individual's right of conscience are central to our Unitarian Universalist heritage.

Congregations may establish statements of purpose, covenants, and bonds of union so long as they do not require that members adhere to a particular creed.
