Beloved Friends and Members at UUFSD,

The past two months have brought forth unfathomable devastation on communities all around our country as the very principles that bind us together have been attacked. As Unitarian Universalists, we hold freedom of speech, democracy, diversity, inclusion, and equity (among other things) as foundational to who we are. Before the current administration took office, I reminded all of you that one of the most powerful forms of resistance we have is the simple act of being together. We will probably man the shelter at St. James in 2026 near the end of January as we have done for a number of years. We had around 35 volunteers this year and could use a few more next year. These demonstrations and protests occurred in all 50 states including Washington, D.C. Demonstrators protested the flurry of executive orders President Trump has signed since he took office last month, particularly ones aimed at overhauling the country's climate policies, immigration system and reproductive rights.

Social Justice Action Committee Meeting Sunday, February 23



The Social Justice Action Committee (SJA) held its first committee meeting of 2025. Thirty members friends and visitors attended the meeting. Here are the minutes and highlights from the meeting:

The committee felt that we should meet monthly rather than quarterly as we navigate the difficult nationwide social and political waters. <u>Save the dates</u> for our upcoming monthly meetings in Founders Hall - Sundays 11:30 am: March 23 - April 27 - May 18 - Jun 29 - Jul 20 - Aug 17 - Sep 21 - Oct 19 - Nov 16 - Dec 21.



Generosity Sundays: We donate the offering of one Sunday service each month to an agency, organization or project which serves the causes of our program areas of social justice. **The SJA approved the following organizations:** Open Oceans (Environmental: addressing global ocean plastics) - Fill A Belly (Homelessness: featuring weekly meals for unhoused neighbors) - Stay Cool for Grandkids (Climate Action: elementary school educational program) - North County LGBTQ Center (Upgrade for Unicorn Village, transitional housing)



The Immigration Support Group will develop short and longer term goals to meet the challenge of the government's targeting of undocumented persons. Our immediate concerns are the impact on families and possible displacement and detention. We will continue to be involved in a Solana Beach group providing mutual aid and other services to residents of La Colonia/Eden Gardens. **This group has opportunities for our members to be involved.** We will work with UURise, the ACLU, and other local organizations to protect North County's immigrant communities. **Get involved: contact Robin Sales:** immigration@uufsd.org

Homelessness Fill a Belly/Toiletries: We have monthly Fill a Belly dinner dates through December 2025. We are hopeful that our very successful Shower Token and toiletry projects will continue. Get involved: contact Terry Goan at homelessness@uufsd.org

Communications: The SJA met with the Communication Committee to create a **Social Justice Action Center Weekly Update.** This will facilitate spreading the news about trainings, lectures, demonstrations and other Social Justice events and actions members and friends can take. We are still in the process of setting up a system that will allow members to participate by supplying information on upcoming projects and events.



We are affiliated with the Unitarian Universalists for Justice in the Middle East. We share in the mission of educating and mobilizing to counter inequality and injustice in Palestine-Israel and support in global efforts to end oppression of minority and historically disenfranchised groups. We support the global Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) movement by putting political and economic pressure on Israel to respect Palestinian rights and comply with international law. We plan to continue this mission through educational films, forming reading circles, and networking with like-minded organizations. We encourage members to join the Green Olive Solidarity Circle to learn first-hand about the struggles of Palestinians.

One of the goals of the Palestine-Israel Justice Group is to sign the American Friends Service Committee's Apartheid-Free Communities Pledge which is supported by the UUA. Get involved: contact Jason Folkman: PalestineIsraelJustice@uufsd.org



The Climate Action Group encourages

- the use of electricity from renewable energy sources; we hold regular plantbased potluck luncheons.
- the use of the *Climate Action Now* app, which facilitates regular (even daily!) political advocacy for climate-friendly policies.
- everyone to reduce, re-use, repair, recycle.
- participation in San Diego's FixIt clinics
- proper disposal of waste into green waste, recycling, and landfill bins both on campus and at home (recycle).

We publish brief articles in our newsletter that seek to inspire and educate readers about climate issues. And when it comes to the impact of the spiritual, we host UUFSD's annual Earth Service where we (re)focus everyone's attention on the Unitarian Universalist 7th Principle of *respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.*

Our Helping Our Neighbors Homeless Project provides another valuable service for our Fill a Belly guests, our Shower Token Program. Below are testimonials from the Encinitas Fill a Belly Coordinator and the Fill a Belly Shower Token distributor, indicating the significance of this program.

"It is difficult to not have a home, but it is even more difficult to not feel human. Hygiene is a major factor in a person's confidence, presence, and humanity. Before the shower tokens, many of our guests would avoid sitting at our tables.... some would even avoid attending Fill-A-Belly (and many other life-saving events) because they knew they would offend people with their smell. It dug their insecurity hole deeper and contributed to them avoiding the help that the community, city, state, and federal were offering.. The shower tokens created a way for our guests to assimilate back into society. Such a small thing to us as a shower, can be the difference between someone surviving the streets and thriving with shelter, career, and/or food... or them facing poor hygiene and hiding in the shadows, falling deeper into despair, and not getting the help they so desperately need."

"We applaud the shower token program for its powerful impact it has on our guests and the community. The ability to have a person feel seen, clean, and optimistic... starts them on the road to a better, brighter life. It is the initial seed that will hopefully grow into a second chance at happiness."

Unitarian Universalists for Justice in the Middle East marks 500+ communities pledging to be "Apartheid-Free"



Today, the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, Unitarian Universalists for Justice in the Middle East (UUJME) joins with communities all over the world to mark an important milestone: over 500 congregations and organizations have <u>taken a pledge</u> declaring themselves "apartheid-free." Pledge signers commit to cut ties with Israel's apartheid regime against Palestinians and to oppose all forms of racism, bigotry, discrimination, and oppression. These 500+ groups represent hundreds of thousands of constituents

and include congregations, faith communities, solidarity organizations, non-profits, student organizations, veterans' groups, businesses, and even municipalities.

The UUJME board stated this about the reason we signed the pledge, "Unitarian Universalists for Justice in the Middle East is a proud original signatory of the Apartheid-Free Communities pledge. We took the pledge because it invites commitment to collective study and action within a growing movement of communities in solidarity with Palestinians in their struggle for liberation. As Unitarian Universalists, we center love in human relations and believe in accountable transformation of injustice by building a united symphony of many voices for witness, education, organizing, and advocacy. Taking this pledge and organizing other groups to do so is one of the most meaningful commitments that a congregation or other group can make. UUJME worked in a coalition at the Unitarian Universalist Association 2024 General Assembly to overwhelmingly pass a resolution in solidarity with Palestinians which called for UU congregations to join Apartheid Free Communities. We are proud to support the adoption of the pledge in three UU congregations so far."

The three Unitarian Universalist congregations that have signed the pledge include All Souls Unitarian Universalist Church of Shreveport, Louisiana; Berkeley Fellowship of Unitarian Universalists; and the Unitarian Universalist Society of San Francisco. Several other UU congregations are in discussion about the pledge.

For decades, the Palestinian people have faced Israeli occupation and systematic human rights abuses. Apartheid is defined under international law as a legally enforced system of separation and oppression based on race, creed, or ethnicity. Palestinian human rights groups have described Israel's policies as apartheid for decades. Over the past few years, much of the international human rights community – including **B'tselem**, **Human Rights Watch**, and **Amnesty International** – have also joined the call for an end to Israeli apartheid.

The Apartheid-Free campaign originated in 2022 when an interdenominational coalition of faith groups in North America, convened by the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), came together to organize the pledge.

UUJME is proud to be among the original 13 national faith groups that organized and signed the pledge to be apartheid-free.

"The fact that more than 500 congregations, organizations, and businesses have come together to end Israeli apartheid fills me with hope," said Noor Nabulsi, Apartheid-Free Communications Specialist for AFSC. "These groups represent hundreds of thousands of people from many different places, faiths, and walks of life. What we share is a belief that collectively we are growing the anti-apartheid movement and making it a 21st century issue."

Each community that signs the pledge commits to resisting apartheid and all forms of racism and discrimination, but this looks different in every community. It can include community education, political advocacy, divestment, protest, organizing ballot measures, or creative projects.

UUJME supports local UU congregations in their journey to become apartheid-free.


Piano Update

The Baldwin Grand L piano in the Fellowship Hall was found to need repair in an evaluation performed in early July. After searching for a technician, the Music Committee decided to use Brian Janey at Allegro Piano Service, who spent the last week in July reconditioning the action of the piano. It was a big job involving removal of the piano to Allegro for repair. Now that it is back in the Hall, the piano sounds much cleaner and brighter. The Music Committee will have Mr. Janey back for a return before the Christmas Season.

This is after the cleaning of the key frame. After cleaning the keyframe, the pins (on which the keys glide), and a new front rail were installed.



This is the hammer shaped like a tiny belt sander specially made for the task of refreshing the surface of the hammers. The hammers on the right you can see have been resurfaced and those on the left still have their grooves from the strings.

The UUFSD Music Program is a vital ministry which deepens and enhances the spiritual life of the congregation and the larger community through the universal experience of music. Music is an important part of our Sunday service. Led by our Music Director and our Pianist, a typical Sunday service includes instrumental pieces, congregational hymns, music for meditation, special musical performances, and more. We strive for balance in our music program, between new and familiar music, polished musical performances and good old-fashioned sing-alongs.

Twice per year, in the winter and spring, we dedicate our entire Sunday service to spiritual exploration through music. These Music Sundays feature the UUFSD Choir, and often other artists, including dancers, instrumentalists, and community professional musicians. Recent Music Sunday services have centered on the themes of pursuing freedom, persevering through difficult times, and imagining a better world.




Steve Milloy UUFSD Music Director

Composer Steve Milloy (UUFSD MusicDirector) and Lyricist Kim Hines Present the River City Mixed Chorus premiere of <u>"Rebel With A Cause</u> <u>Sincerely Yours, Pauli Murray"</u>

This multi-movement composition highlights the life and work of American civil rights activist, Reverend Pauli Murray. Murray was a legal scholar whose seminal work in 1950 on States' Laws on Race and Color was described as "the bible" of the civil rights movement by Thurgood Marshall, then general counsel of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). In her later life, Murray

became the first African American woman to be ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church. All during her life and certainly after her death in 1985, Murray, was considered a trailblazer in the fight for equality for women, people of color, and the LGBTQ+ community.

Murray was not alone in being a fierce rebel with a cause, of course, and for all who fought for equity and human rights in the mid- to late-20th century there was a diverse and distinctive musical soundtrack for the era. RCMC will perform a selection of these protest songs that undoubtedly inspired Murray and fellow angelic troublemakers, including Sam Cooke's A Change Is Gonna Come, John Lennon's Give Peace a Chance, and Joni Mitchell's Big Yellow Taxi.

Special Sunday Service

On Sunday, February 9th, Rev. Ellie and Heather led a multigenerational service designed for play and community building. Nine different stations were created at tables in Founders' Hall and people in attendance could choose which activity they wanted to participate in. Activities included: Drawing/coloring, Storytelling, Music, Playdoh Chalice making, Conversation & Fidget Toys, Jenga block building, Puzzles, Lego/MagnaTiles building, and a Quiet Corner for people who wanted to limit their stimulation. Generations worked together or side-by-side on creative tasks that fostered connection and community. Following the project free-time, individuals shared their experiences and what they had created. It was a special opportunity to include fun and our UUFSD children in a spiritual multigenerational worship setting.
